In 1975, the Education for All Handicapped Children Act and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act established a right for all children to attend public school.

Stamps said when children with disabilities began being involved in the public school system, Hope Haven became an Adult Training Program, serving people 21 and older.

In 1994 Hope Haven was changed to ARC of the Shoals, with a new focused on "people's abilities not their disabilities."

The ARC of the Shoals currently serves 74 clients from the school at 100 Lamar Street in Tuscumbia and 17 homes the ARC oversees.

Stamps said the ARC of the Shoals serves clients in Colbert, Franklin and Lauderdale counties.

about the ARC of the Shoals as it hosts an open house from 4-6 p.m. at the offices off Old Lee Highway in Tuscumbia on Lamar Street.

"A lot of people remember the old Hope Haven, but they really don't know what we are all about," said Marvin Meek, president of the ARC of the Shoals Board of Directors

Meek said the ARC provides a day program that offers training and gives clients a place to go.

"We are an advocate for people with disabilities," Stamps said.

He said the program offers training and help to get the clients jobs as well as help them develop social skills.



"We do vocational skills and pre-vocational skills," Stamps said.

Meek, whose son has been involved in the program, said the open house is a chance for the public to "see what we are all about."

"We still provide a day service and a lot more," he said.

"There is a need for the services provided by the ARC," McDaniel said. "The ARC of the Shoals is a valuable resource to the clients they serve."
