

Homelessness and substance use disorder are often linked. The homeless experience much higher rates of alcohol and substance use disorders than those with housing stability. Substance Use Disorder can develop due to the stressors associated with homelessness, and addiction can also contribute to home loss. For people who are already struggling to pay their bills, the onset or exacerbation of an addiction may cause them to lose their housing.
